Dear Community:

This past year the Michigan State Legislature passed new School Election Laws. The new legislation requires School Board Elections to be held in November of even years. The intent of the new law was to save districts dollars by aligning school elections with state/national election dates. While the intent of the new law is understandable, there are complexities that every school district must deal with individually.

Currently, Hudsonville Public Schools' Board of Education are on a 2-2-2-1 rotation. Consequently, there is at most two new board members every school year. The benefit to this type of rotation is that you have veteran and new board members working together to further the district's mission. With the new election law, if the school board does not vote to adjust term length, the board member rotation will be 4-3. That is, every other even year four new board members could be elected. Changing a majority of the board members all at once in any organization could create instability.

Therefore, our Hudsonville Board of Education has been discussing and will be soon voting on adjusting board member term length from 4 years to 6 years. By extending the terms of board members, this will allow for the district to be on a 2-3-2 rotation. Allowable under the new law, a board can make this adjustment with any new six year term board member elected by the community.

Another complexity pertains to the 18 mill non-homestead property tax. Hudsonville levies its property tax on a 50% summer and 50% winter basis. Most school districts in Michigan levy their taxes on a 100% summer basis. Given our 50/50 basis we run the risk of losing approximately \$3.9 million in general fund revenue if we do not place the 18 mill non-homestead property tax on the May ballot as we have in the past. We could try to extend the millage to reach the new election date. However, our Board of Education prefers to provide a consistent message to our community and maintain the ballot language that has been in place for the past eighteen years.

The annual school election will be held on Tuesday, May 8. There is one issue on the ballot:

#### ♦ Non-Homestead Renewal

Hudsonville voters will be asked to approve the **annual renewal** of the 18 mill non-homestead property tax. This is a tax on businesses and second homes, not on homestead residences or qualified agricultural property. State Education Taxes on homestead residences will remain at the 1994 millage rate.

In November of 2012, in addition to the Presidential Election, we will have our annual school board election where two seats will be up for a vote. As we approach the November Election, we will communicate the specifics of the ballot.

We are deeply grateful for our community's continued support. Especially during these difficult financial times, passage of the Non-Homestead Renewal allows the district to maintain the current millage rate for operational funding. Please remember to vote on May 8th.

Valentines Cards and these were sent to two different



## THE POWER OF A PERSONAL NOTE!

Forest Grove Elementary students are working hard every day to improve their writing skills. By the end of 5<sup>th</sup> grade, one of the expectations is that students will be able to proficiently create personal narrative writing that includes the following:

- \* A focused small moment event written in a step-by-step sequence that begins with an interesting lead.
- \* The story contains a problem, rising action, and a resolution or lesson.
- \* A variety of details and descriptive language to convey meaning are used.
- \* The setting is developed throughout the story and describes what a character sees, hears, smells, or feels.
- \* Characters are differentiated from each other.
- \* Text shows flexibility and contains a balance of dialogue, precise actions, and thoughts.



Wow! What a challenging undertaking for many adults, let alone upper elementary students! One of the teaching/ learning strategies that really helps students to engage, to enjoy the writing process, and to hone their writing skills is that of peer editing. The simple task of having a fellow classmate read one's writing and then give constructive feedback is not only fun, but powerfully effective for both participants. Of course, some training on how to be an effective evaluator and how to give meaningful feedback is necessary. Once this is understood, however, the learning potential of this unique kind of positive "peer pressure" may be just what our kids need more of! They love it and it works!

Sea creatures, skiing, football, and even chinchillas. These are just some of the topics that second graders at Jamestown Elementary shared with their families and friends during a recent Expert Fair to celebrate their nonfiction writing. Each second grader planned, wrote, and published a

nonfiction book to teach others about a topic of expertise. During daily writing workshop, students had the opportunity to study the work of authors who write nonfiction, develop their own topic across multiple chapters, and add in text features such as captions and bold words. Second graders even talked

about various methods of research to collect more information about their topics. All of this learning culminated with the Expert Fair. The second graders taught the visitors the most important things about their topics and shared parts of their books. Students enjoyed writing for a real audience and learned that nonfiction books are meant to teach!



## CHILDREN AND FIRE

Few chemical reactions have interwoven so deeply within the human survival and sensory experience as fire. Our lives depend on it. Fire is essential for keeping us safe, warm and fed. It also seems to be a requisite for happiness and relaxation. Birthday candles, campfires, scented votives; we use fire to create fun, memorable experiences. How can something so vital to human existence be so misunderstood? Consider the following statistics: The United States Fire Administration reported in 2010, there were over 312,000 reported fires in people's homes. The fires resulted in 2,555 deaths and 13,275 injuries. These fires caused over 6.6 billion dollars worth of property damage (www.usfa.fema.gov). These numbers show how much we do not understand about fire safety, prevention, and survival.

Children misusing fire is a public health issue of particular interest to fire departments, schools, law enforcement agencies, courts, and families across the country. The National Fire Protection Association (NFPA) released a report in 2011 citing that from 2005-2009 an average of 56,300 child-playing fires were reported to United States municipal fire departments per year. The fires caused annual averages of 110 civilian deaths, 880 civilian injuries, and \$286 million dollars in property damage. Structure fires accounted for 22% of the fires, but 98% of the fatalities. Half of the home fires were started by lighters, 19% by matches, and 6% by candles. 40% of the fires began in the bedroom and bedding/mattress material was the item first ignited in 24% of the home structure fires. 44% of the home structure fires were started by a child between the age of 4 and 6. Outside (or unclassified fires) were started 2 out of 5 times by a child between the ages of 10-12 (www.nfpa.org).

The above statistics are based on data reported through the National Fire Incident Reporting System (NFIRS). It is important to note, however, that NFIRS reports are filled out only when fire departments respond to the call. Many fires are not even reported to the fire department making the actual damages done by child set fires even higher than the data indicates.

As a community, we can make a difference with children and fire. Reporting all fires to the fire department is one way to make a difference. Even if the fire is out, contact your local fire department. This is especially important in child set fires. Children identified as intentionally misusing fire or playing with fire (or explosives) should be immediately referred to the West Michigan FIREmatch program (I-866-314-1116). West Michigan FIREmatch has been intervening with children for over 20 years. A FIREmatch screener will meet with the family and the child to assess the fire misuse and determine the best intervention plan. Children who have misused fire often fall within a specific category of firesetting behavior and require a specific intervention in order for the behavior to stop. The most common intervention is fire education. At times, the fire misuse may be motivated by troubled thoughts and feelings. Fire specific mental health services may be warranted to help the child and family improve. West Michigan FIREmatch will help link the family to appropriate services when those interventions are needed.

It is important to recognize fire (and explosive) misuse by children. Fire misuse cannot be ignored. Help is available. # LEGISLATIVE UPDATE

One of the S.O.A.R. I goals for the Human Services Group is to monitor legislative changes and communicate the educational implications to the Hudsonville Public Schools staff and community. Matt's Safe School Law requires our Board of Education to adopt and implement a policy prohibiting bullying in our schools and at school functions. A committee made up of students, parents, teachers, counselors, and administrators has been reviewing and making revisions to our current policy language that prohibits bullying. We are excited to report that the committee is close to having a policy revision ready to recommend to the Board of Education. ## Parents/Guardians do you, or someone you know, have a child who will turn four by December 1, 2012? Would you like to have them attend preschool at NO cost?

GSRP (Great Start Readiness Preschool) is a **FREE** state-funded preschool program for Hudsonville four year olds who meet certain criteria. This program allows children who qualify an opportunity to receive a high-

quality preschool experience who may not otherwise have the chance. Parent/ Guardian's must provide transportation to and from the program.

Children meeting at least two of the 25 criteria listed on the application can qualify. Some examples of the criteria include:

•Household income, for example a family of 4 is under \$66,000 annual income

- •Single parent
- •Unemployed parent

The Hudsonville Public Schools' GSRP program has openings as long as state budget allocations allow. Families who show the greatest need will be enrolled first. Registration for the 2012/2013 school year are now being accepted. For more
